OHMAR MEETS ON THE WESTERN SHORE: ST. MARY'S COLLEGE

Saturday, April 11, 1992

This year OHMAR's spring meeting will be held at St. Mary's College of Maryland, along the banks of the St. Mary's River in Historic St. Mary's City. Founded in 1840 as Maryland's "living monument" to its colonial legacy, this honors college is a state-sponsored, publicly supported four-year institution. OHMAR is the first group to be able to hold its conference in the newly renovated library and media center.

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But while the 275-acre setting is a stunning conference site, don't expect to wander the streets of St. Mary's City. They do not exist. The third oldest continuous English settlement in the United States, St. Mary's City presently exists as a relatively undisturbed archaeological site whose pre-colonial Indian settlements and colonial overlay make it an ideal "laboratory" for studying the past. The surrounding lands are still cultivated for tobacco, and watermen continue to harvest crabs, oysters, and fish. Some twenty miles north, the visitor can catch the Amish market in Mechanicsville each Wednesday and Saturday and stock up on farm-fresh produce.

Program chairperson, Andrea Hammer, Professor of English and Director of St. Mary's County Documentation Project, promises an exciting and informative program. Located approximately an hour and forty-five minutes by car from the Washington

Metropolitan area, members may wish to spend the weekend visiting nearby historic exhibits.

Demonstrates advantages and pitfalls of videotaping oral history.

TRAVEL DIRECTIONS

From Washington, D.C.

Follow the beltway going south on 95, the Maryland side. Take exit directing you to Route 5, Old Branch Avenue, Waldorf direction. The exit is near (but not to be confused with) Andrews AFB.

Follow Rt. 5 (301) to Waldorf.

In Waldorf, continue on Rt. 5 by making a left-hand turn at traffic light. (Toward Historic Southern Maryland, Patuxent Naval Air Station, and Lexington Park.)

Continue on Rt. 5 as breaks off the main route and cuts to the right shortly after you pass through Newmarket.

Follow Rt. 5 south the rest of the way to St. Mary's College and Historic St. Mary's City. OHMAR signs to the Library.

From Baltimore

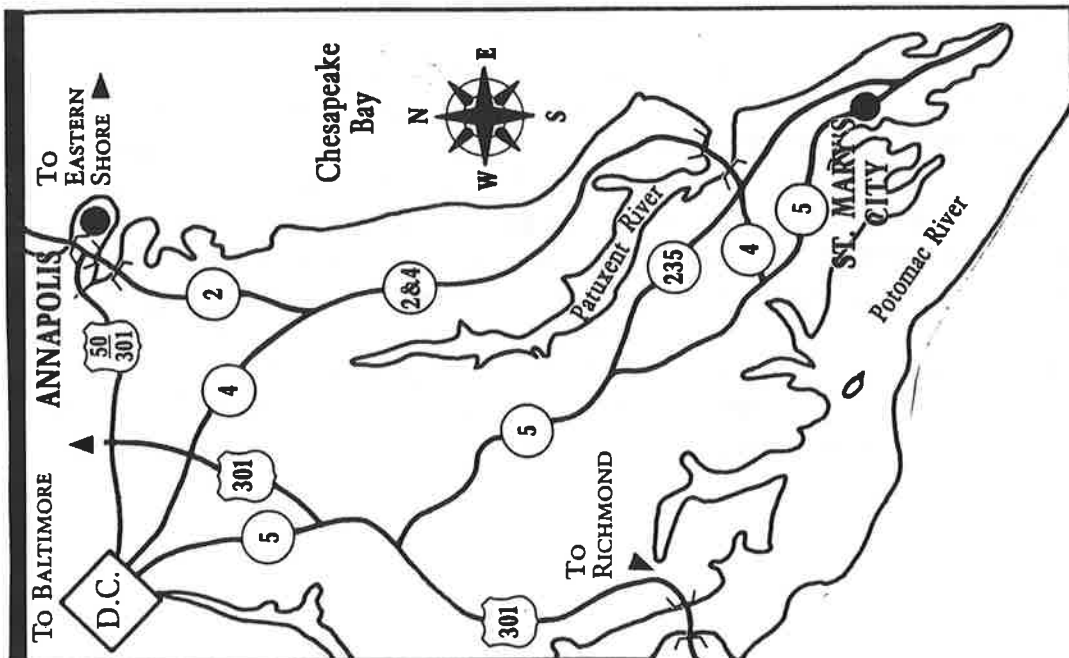
Follow 95 south to the Washington Beltway, then follow above instructions.

From Virginia

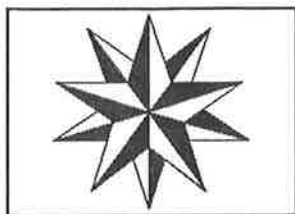
Take 301 north toward the Potomac River Bridge.

Cross the Potomac River Bridge and resume briefly on 301 going north two or three miles to Allens Fresh and the Rt. 234 turnoff.

Take 234 to Leonardtown, where you pick up Rt. 5 south to St. Mary's.

requirement from the ByLaws.

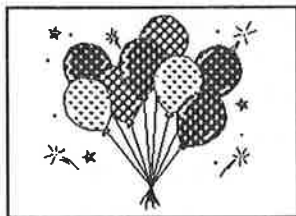
Rationale:

**PROJECT REPORT: ORAL
LITERATURE/HISTORY OF WORLD
WAR II VETERANS**

Donald B. Veix

I am an Associate Professor of Education at Rider College. I have recently completed a sabbatical leave to record the war experiences of World War II veterans. I began this project in 1976 in order to preserve the veterans' personal view of what happened to them and to their buddies.

My main purpose is preservation. Veterans have told me that editors of popular history, fiction, and films have distorted incidents that the veterans took part in. "Distortion" is a mild translation. The veterans fear that these inaccuracies will begin to be accepted as truth. These inaccuracies do not honor the memories of the men who were left behind on beaches, burning aircraft, or sinking ships.

How will tapes and photographs be used? I have originated and taught several courses on WW II. The recordings have also been the basis for three poems that I have written. Some tapes have been placed in our college library where professors and students may listen to them.

I am also interested in the writing of the veterans: letters, diaries, POW logs, and material they wrote after the war.
